



Accessible documents at International Nuclear Services (INS)

This policy explains how accessible the documents INS publishes on www.innuserv.com are.

Using our documents

INS publishes documents in a range of formats, including: PDFs and MS Excel. INS wants as many people as possible to be able to use those documents. For example, when INS produces a document, it makes sure to:

- Provide a HTML option where possible
- Tag headings and other parts of the document properly, so screen readers can understand the page structure
- Make sure alt text next to non-decorative images is used, so people who can't see them understand what they're there for
- Avoid using tables, except when we're presenting data
- Write in plain English

How accessible our documents are

New documents published and documents you need to download should be fully accessible. But INS knows some older documents (published before 23 September 2018) are not accessible.

For example, some:

- Are not tagged up properly (don't contain correct headings or alt text)
- Contain technical content that isn't written in plain English
- Contain tables that include text rather than data
- Are photocopies and aren't marked up in a way that allows users to understand them

This mostly applies to reports needed for active administrative processes. These documents are exempt from the regulations, and there are no plans to make them accessible.

Enforcement procedure

The Equality and Human Rights Commission is responsible for enforcing the Public Sector Bodies (websites and mobile apps) (No2) Accessibility Regulations 2018 (the 'accessibility regulations'). If you're not happy with how we respond to your complaint, contact the Equality Advisory and Support Service.

Technical info about the accessibility of our documents

INS is committed to making documents accessible, in accordance with the Public Sector Bodies Accessibility Regulations 2018.

The documents INS publishes are not compliant with the Web Content Accessibility Guidelines version 2.1 AA standards.

Non-accessible content

The content below is non-accessible as it's not compliant with the Web Content Accessibility Guidelines. This is because:

- A few of the INS documents have diagrams. These images don't have a text alt so the info isn't available to people using screen reader
- Some documents are not created with headings. These documents are not structured logically so the info cannot be navigated by people using screen reader
- Audio files might not have captions/subtitles. These files don't have a text alt so info in them isn't available to people with hearing difficulties

Content not within the scope of accessibility regulations

Older PDFs and MS Word documents (published before 23 September 2018) might not meet accessibility standards/be structured correctly. INS is not required to fix these documents. However, any new PDFs or MS Word documents INS publishes will meet the required standards.

What INS is doing to improve accessibility

INS aims to ensure all authors of documents published externally are aware of the Web Content Accessibility Guidelines. Employees responsible for creating documents are being trained accordingly.
